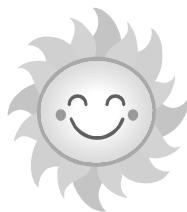

SPEAKING MY MIND

I've never been a fan of roller coasters. When my sons were young, my husband was always the "designated rider". He never seemed to mind...he enjoyed speeding through the air, at an unimaginable height, like a human projectile, while being flipped over and over, and thrown topsy-turvy. Just watching the three of them nauseated me, and was frightening beyond belief.

Last week's happy, then sad, budget news has been like a déjà vu experience for me...if I close my eyes, I'm back at Six Flags, feeling physically ill as I stare at my sweet little boys, strapped into the 'Tidal Wave' as it makes it's ascent, and then plunges towards the earth...upside down! On Monday evening, I was on such a 'high' when the School Board approved the restoration of proposed Para and Bi-Lingual EA cuts. The next morning, I, like many of you, awoke to the devastating headlines in the Oregonian, "Latest Forecast Signals Deeper Cuts".

As I read those words, I began to plummet towards the realization that my great elation was being tossed about like the riders on that coaster. No longer was I happy, as I read that PPS's share of these cuts could reach \$19 million. At a cost of eleven FTE per \$1 million, that equates to a loss of 209 full-time teaching positions, or an equivalency!

So, what does this mean for Portland Public Schools? Where will these cuts come from? As I write this article, nobody really knows the answer to those questions. Sitting in on the School Board's Finance Committee meeting last Wednesday, a number of suggestions were bantered about...shorten the school year, focus on staffing, make equitable cuts, change the student-teacher ratio. There are priorities that will be maintained, including full-day Kindergarten, and staffing in ESL.

Too often, in the past, PPS budget shortfalls have been balanced on the backs of the Classified Employees. As support staff, we're not as visible to the public, nor to parents. Those in charge strive to maintain lower class sizes, to protect families from the harsh realities facing education, all the while reducing the numbers of those employees that truly keep the schools & buildings operational. It's time for this to stop. Let them see what's really at stake here...the educational quality of this District's children!

Rather than make further cuts to schools and staff, I believe that an abbreviated school year---**NOT** furlough days for employees---would have the most impact on the public; those on whom we rely for support and subsidy. Furlough days, generally, are "hidden" days, and the pain that results is only felt by the employees. I believe that EVERYONE should suffer through this shocking ride. The parent whose child stays home because of a shortened school year will push the state to find PERMANENT, STABLE FUNDING for our schools. The public must be made aware of how it feels when our schools derail; when they're no longer able stay atop the platforms of successful learning.

Yesterday's headlines read that Legislators in Salem are scrambling to make changes, and an attempt will be made to call a special session of the legislature to address the budget cuts to education. Will this work? Your guess is as good as mine...and that's not saying much!

In the meantime...fasten your seatbelts! It's going to be a bumpy ride!

BARGAINING UPDATE~

Our bargaining team met last Tuesday with the District's new team, now led by the recently hired lead negotiator, Brock Logan. Brock comes to Portland from Olympia, where he represented labor---Washington State AFSCME.

It's been nearly a year since we met with the District, and I'm hopeful that we can skip the games that we've felt have been played by past District teams, and go right to the meat. We need to get this contract settled, NOW. We know what we want, and certainly, deserve, and I believe that it's time to end this like adults. While our full contract is current until June 30, 2011, we need to finalize 'Compensation' for 2009-10 & 2010-11 school years, as well as insurance benefits for 2010-11.

As soon as we have anything "ratifiable", you'll be the first to hear!
